students, particularly those who wish to terminate their studies at the Pre-degree stage and

A. degree course two patterns have been adopted for the optional subjects under part III, Viz. the first pattern of one Main subject and two subsidiaries and II pattern of two subjects of equal standard. We have been granted affiliation in B. Sc. special in Mathematics, and B. Sc. General in Mathematics, and B. Sc. deneral in Mathematics, with appropriate subsidiaries and in B. A. part III we have pattern I, in the case of Economics with History and Politics as subsidiaries and with History and Politics as subsidiaries and Pattern II in Islamic History and Arabic. All these courses have been started this year except Mathematics for the General B. Sc. since we preferred Mathematics for the special B. Sc. as a more appropriate feeder course for our M. Sc.

There are at present sixty nine members on the staff including a Part-time facturer in Accountancy. A few posts which were created this year were filled in June and I am glad to say that after July 1966, there has been absolutely no change of staff this year. Such stability of staff is an unprecedented but a very welcome feature, for changes of staff during the course of the academic year are extremely undesirable.

#### Results in University Examinations

I am glad to state that we have maintained
our high standard of performance in the University examinations this year also. In the Pre-degree
examination 186 out of 333 students who sat for
the examination came out successful, the percentage of pass being 56, which is far above the
University average. There were 14 first classes
and 63 second classes, which is really creditable.

In the B. A. degree Exam. 31 out of 36 passed in all parts, percentage of pass being 89. The students who secured the first and second ranks in Arabic Viz. K. M. Mohamed and Miss Habeeba K. were also the holders of the I and II ranks in the University and were awarded the U. G. C. special Scholarship respectively for further saindies,

In B. Com however this time only 8 out of 17 passed, quite contrary to the usual pattern. Exam. in the University and was awarded the National Merit Scholarship for higher studies.

In M. Sc. out of the 5 students who sat for the Exam. four passed, of whom three secured II classes. Considering the University average for M. Sc for the year which was only 34%, our 84% is a very creditable record.

The Govern-ment has been pleased to give us the basic grant of Rs. 200/. common to all Planning Forums and a special grant of Rs. 400/. for our Forum, in appreciation of our work.

Hotels

The College is patterned on the residential model and hostel life is an integral part of the Collegista life. However with the rapid increase in the intake it has not been possible to increase hostel accommodation proportionately. We have at present 375 students in the seven hostels of the College including the Women's Hostel with a strength of 57. The President of the Managing Committee, Janaba A. K. Kumbinsyan Hajee has constructed three additional rooms this year in the hostel donated by him. Our Project for the construction of a suitable hostel for women stu-

It is an imperative need of this institution.

Each hostel has its own mess arrangements under the supervision of the Deputy Warden and student representatives. The Deputy wardens and Resident Tutors residing with the students in the hostels maintain a healthy atmosphere of scholastic life. The Hostel Associations have been very active this year. Their annual functions are memorable events of the Collegiate life. The Hostels entered on a spirited competition in the Installed annual variety Entertainment contest held in the College on the 23rd and 24th February and the S. S. Hostel annexed the Shield this year.



# A BRIEF REPORT ABOUT THE PHYSICAL ACTVITIES FOR THE YEAR 1966 - '67

The College teams took part in the Inter Collegiate Tournaments in almost all games except Cricket and Athletics. The Badminton team also took part in the Rev. Fr. Theodocious Memorial Tournament.

The College Volley Ball Team won the Kozhikode zone finals for the third year in succession defeating the Govt. Arts College Calicut, the Guruvayurappan College the Medical College and the Govt. College Chittor. In the Inter Zone Matches at Changanacherry, the team lost to Christ College Irinjalakuda the Champions this year during the semi-finals.

P. S. Mohamed Kassim and N. Aboobacker of our College were selected to represent the University of Kerala Volley Ball team this year.

The Basket Ball team lost to St. Joseph's College by nine points.

The College Hockey team drew with the N. S. S. Engineering College Palghat on the first day and lost the replay by a solitary goal.

In the Football Tournament the College team won the match against the Regional Engineering College and lost to Sree Narayana College Cannanore. For the first time in the history of the College, the Tennis team won the Kozhikode Zone Finals in the Davis Cup Line defeating the Regional Engineering College, the Malabar Christian College and the Guruvayurappan College Calicut. In the Inter Zone matches at Trivandrum, the Tennis team lost to Mar Ivanio's College team in the finals.

In the Rev. Fr. Theodocious Memorial Badminton Tournament, the College team won the matches against the Kerala Polytechnic and the Guruvayurappan College Calicut and lost to the Medical College Calicut in the Finals.

Unfortunately this year the venue and the dates of the Cricket Tournament were changed and the matches were fixed during the Ramzan holidays and therefore the College team was not able to take part.

## REPORT OF THE ACTIVITIES DURING THE YEAR

1966-'67

# REPORT OF THE MAIN HOSTEL

1966-'67
