I am happy to present to you the 24th Annual Report of the Farook College. I am glad that I have the privilege of doing so in the presence of our esteemed guest Dr. A. Aiyappan, Former Vice-Chancellor of the University of Kerala who is presiding over the College Day celebrations. I am also happy that the District Collector Shri M. G. K. Moorthy, I. A. S. has so kindly consented to inaugurate the celebrations in spite of his busy official engagements.

I am presenting only a very brief report of the more important activities of the College as I think it indeed difficult to cover all the activities at length.

#### Admission and Strength

The College re-opened after the Summer vacation on 14-6-71. Admissions were a problem this year also on account of the heavy rush for some favoured groups and subjects. The junior Pre-Degree classes started functioning on 12-7-71. The Bridge Intensive Course classes were conducted for I Pre-Degree students for about 12 days with a view to improving their standard in English and introducing them to new methods of study. By the middle of August, admissions to first Degree courses were also completed and classes started on 10-8-71. The strength of the college as on date is 1739 including 223 women students. #### Examinations

The performance of our students in the University Examinations was really noteworthy. In several subjects they have scored cent percent passes and nearly cent percent in many other subjects. In M. A. English 11 students passed out of 12 with 1 first class, 7 second classes and 3 third classes, the percentage of pass being 92. In M. A. Arabic 8 students passed out of 8 appeared with 3 first classes, 4 second classes and 1 third class. The percentage of pass is 100. In M. Sc. Mathematics 13 students passed out of 13 appeared with 9 first classes, 2 second classes and 2 third classes. The percentage is 100. In M. Sc. Maths the First Rank of the University was held by Sri.

C. P. Aboobacker of this college. In final B. A. (Econ) 53 passed out of 64 with 11 II classes and 42 III classes, the percentage of pass being 83. In final B. A. (Islamic History) 6 passed out of 6 with 5 I classes and 1 II class. In B. Sc. (Physics) 13 passed out of 26.1 scoring ! class, 4.11 classes and 8. III. The pass percentage being 50%. In B. Sc. Chemistry 33 students passed out of 38. 5 students passed in I classes, 20 students in II classes and 8 in It classes, the percentage of pass being 87. In B. Sc. Botany 28 passed out of 31 with 11 | classes, 11 II classes and 6 III classes. The percentage of pass is 90. In B. Sc. Zoology 27 passed out of 32 with 7 I classes, 12 II classes and 8 III classes the percentage being 84. In special B. Sc. (Maths) 15 passed out of 15 appeared with 10 I classes, 4 III class. The first rank in the University was scored by A. Ravindran of this college.

In the Pre-Degree 161 students came out successful out of 189 presented for the examination with 20 I classes, 48 II classes and 93 III classes, the percentage of pass being 58.

The College Foot Ball team also qualified for promotion to the Dt. Assn. 'A' Division.

In the University Pilot Athletic Meet and the University Final Athletic Meets, our College Athletes had put up a very fine performance. Mr. M. V. Augustine, III B. Com won two second piaces in 800 Meters and 10,000 Meters races in the University Meet held at St. Joseph's College Devagiri during 1972. Our athletic team won the Championship in the Taluk Sports Festival Meet in January 1972. Four of our Athletes Viz. M. V. Augustine, Vincent De Paul T. G., Ummer Kutty M. and Hassan K. were selected to represent the District Athletic team that participated in the Kerala Sports Festival Meet at Attingal.

T. Mohamed Ashraf, II B. Sc. student of this institution represented the Calicut University Wrestling team in the Inter University Wrestling Championship held at Delhi during Nov. '71. Thirteen students of this college were selected to the IUSE Coaching Camps organized by the Calicut University.

The College Ground was the venue for the 'B' Zone Basket Ball tournament in September 1971.

The College Athletic meet this year was held on 11th and 12th February 1972. The meet was declared open by the Principal on 11-2-72 and Rev. Fr. Vergottini, Principal, Industrial Training Institute, Calicut presided over the closing function on 12-2-72 and distributed the prizes.

In the house tournaments and Athletic Meet the change over of Pattern from 4 houses to seven houses including Lodge residents and Day Scholars achieved the desired result. There was keen competition among the athletes. In the house tournaments the Team Championship was won by the Akbar House securing 19 points. The Team Championship for the annual sports was won by the Azad Hostel securing 61 points and the Day Scholars team secured the 2nd place.

The Individual Championship for men was bracketed between Augustine M. V. of III B. Com. and Vincent De Paul T. G. of I PDC both scoring 25 points each. Rukhiya Beevi of III B. Com won the Individual Championship for Women.

#### N. C. C.

There were 90 cadets in the N. C. C. Army Unit and 50 cadets for the N. C. C. Navy Unit. The Independence Day was colobrated as usual. 35 Army cadets participated in the Republic Day celebrations at Mananchira Maidan at Calicut. 20 N. C. C. cadets volunteered for enrollment in the Emergency Training Scheme and thus proved their readiness to serve the nation in the Indo-Pakistan war crisis. 35 cadets attended ATC at Malappuram. Sgt. Vijaya Raghavan attended the All India Summer Training Camp representing Calicut Group and Sgt. Sathyanathan was attached to the regular Army Unit for 1 month's training at Trivandrum. Cadet Shanmughan P. M. attended the Annual Training Camp at Quilon.

In the Navy Unit Cadet Capt, Padmaraj V, was promoted as Senior Cadet Captain, the one of its kind in the whole Calicut University. Our cadets participated in the Defence Rally organized by the Calicut University Union and Calicut Corporation. 18 Navy cadets attended the Annual Traning Camp at Ernakulam. Our cadets scored the highest marks in 'Kitlay-out' on all Kerala basis. Kunhalikutty Naha K. attended All India Summer Training Camp at Kashmir.

#### Library

We have proceeded a step further in the scientific organization of the Library during the year under report. The whole Library collection except Hindi,

Urdu and Arabic books is classified and catalogued and rearranged on the shelves. According to this new arrangement books on a particular subject can be traced out in the shelves within no time. The cherished goal of cataloging the entire collection of the Library is thus fulfilled this year. The college Library now possesses a collection of 22909 books excluding manuscripts and bound periodicals. The total procurement of books this year itself is 2711 under different subjects. The proportion of students using the college Library has appreciably increased. This is perhaps the result of keeping the library open from 8 A. M. to 8 P. M. taking into account the convenience of students.

#### **Planning Forum**

The Planning Forum of the college this year is credited with vigorous activities right through. 44 students enrolled themselves as members in the Planning Forum. The formal inauguration of the Planning Forum this year was done by Sri, G, K, Panicker, Regional Joint Director of Industries and Commerce, Calicut on 3-1-72, who addressed the students on "the role of small scale Industries in averting educated unemployment". The Forum also undertook the construction of a bye-pass road of a length of 430 ft. from the College Campus to Farook College Ramanattukara Road. All members of the Forum and few others joined in this endeavour.

Three meetings were conducted under the Planning Forum in which papers on interesting topics were presented by the students.

#### Hostels

The Hostels of the College play an important role in the life of this institution as this is a residential college. We have provision for accommodation for about 700 students in seven hostels put together including a Woman's Hostel. Our residential accommodation being the highest of all Arts and Science Colleges in the State. Each hostel has its own Literary Associations and Cultural activities and arrangements for Indoor Games. The Annual break up functions of the students in the hostel were perhaps the grandest functions of the college in

which many distinguished guests were invited to attend and address the students.

To cope with the accommodation problem a new hostel building intended to provide single rooms for the Post Graduate students is now under construction and it is expected that the building will be available for occupation in the next year.

#### Water Supply

The college is a growing community with a constantly increasing demand for water supply. We have a water supply system for the college, the Hostels and staff quarters, built up at a cost of more than Rs. 1.5 lakhs. As the summer advances, the supply dwindles and hence the hostels can have only a restricted and inadequate supply of water. The position is further aggravated by the acute scarcity, almost non-availability of water in the neighbourhood. This hits hard on those dwelling in the many lodges all round, which students occupy in the rainy season, not realizing the acute scarcity of water in store for them in the dry months. The college having exhausted all its resources both in money and the availability of water, has approached the Government for introducing a protected water supply in this area. Since the neighbourhood outside the college campus is involved, the problem can be solved only by Government and Panchayat. After two years of correspondence, finally the Public Health Engineering Department has started moving in the matter. We have conducted some joint inspection for locality sources of water and it is heartening to note that some satisfactory spots have been detected. It is hoped that this scheme will be included in the Rural Water supply schemes and the Rural Water Supply Board have been approached in the matter. It is earnestly hoped that Govt., the Rural Water Supply Board and the Panchayat will act with utmost speed in the solution of the water problem of this locality.

#### U. G. C. Schemes for the College

The College has been very much helped by the various schemes from UGC for its development. We have completed the following schemes this year with UGC assistance:

The proposals for the construction of a gymnasium, the improvement of track and the development of P. G. studies in English Commerce and Chemistry are receiving the consideration of the U. G. C.

In almost all schemes of UGC it is necessary that the college should provide a matching share. Though this has been a burden UGC assistance has been a great factor in the rapid growth of this College and I am thankful to the UGC authorities for the appreciation of the work of this college.

#### Vocational Guidance Centre

The activities of the Vocational Guidance Centre were opened with the registration of members. Out of 600 students registered at the centre 60 students received employment in various Depts, of State Govt., Central Govt, and private agencies in India. One remarkable achievement of the Centre is that 14 candidates were selected for higher studies and research in the Universities of USA, Canada and West Germany through the Centre. Because of some

technical objection only 6 students out of 14 got admission in Stanford University, Ottawa University, Harvard University and the Elmira College, New York,

A series of talks were arranged regarding opportunities in various professions and of higher studies and research for Arts and Science and Commerce students. The educational experts like Justus Lazarus, Divisional Employment Officer, Calicut, Mr. N. Krishnan Nair, Vocational Guidance Officer, Calicut, C. K. Vijayakumar, Employment Officer, Cannanore etc. conducted classes in the above subjects.

There is a small Library attached to the Centre and Employment Bureau, Collection of 600 books cum booklets and journals are maintained in the Library. The copies available in each are not sufficient to meet the demands.

#### National Service Scheme

As per the recommendation of the Central and State Governments and the University of Calicut, Farook College has started National Service Scheme early in November with 100 volunteers. The goal of N. S. Scheme is education through community service, N. S. S. Volunteers constructed and repaired roads in the campus and adjacent areas. A batch of 10 students frequently visited MES hospital at Feroke and Government Hospital at Calicut and helped the patients in all possible ways. Another batch of 10 students visited the high schools at Feroke and Ramanattukara and helped the younger students in their studies and similar activities. The scheme was started late in 1971. As it is difficult to finish 120 hours of work within the short span of time it has been decided to carry out the work during vacation.

#### **New Building**

The completion of the imposing three storey structure with distinctive architectural features is a great landmark in the history of the college and the fulfilment of a great dream. It gives fitting expression of the great work the college is doing in the field of higher education.

The College has embarked on a scheme of constructing a hostel with 100 single rooms. It is slowly progressing inspite of our acute financial burden.

#### Conclusion

The year under report has been a year of great stress and strain in the educational world of Kerala, Nearly two months were lost on account of the teachers strike. The problem of inadequacy in grants in-aid and the consequent financial gaps is still a nightmare for colleges. I hope these problems will

be solved by wise statemanship and liberal approach from all sides. In spite of these and other strains and worries the college has been able to proceed in a smooth fashion. I have received understanding and sympathetic support from the Management and perfect co-operation from the teaching and the non-teaching staff. It has also been my privilege to

have the support and loyalty of the students of the college. The formation of the Alumni Association has enabled us to have direct contact with our former students who are a reservoir of strength for the college. I conclude the report wirh a note of satisfaction and fulfilment and humble prayer to the Almighty for continued blessings.
