The Principal Janab Syed Mohideen Shah inaugurated the Islamic Association. The members of Huttons Orchestra performed a fine musical concert. Mr. Abdul Khader and Miss Pushpa stimulated the audience by their light songs. There was also a dance performance on the occasion.

On 24th August, the Economics, Commerce & History Association was inaugurated by Mr. T.G. Menon, Lecturer of Guruvayurappan

College. Rev. Father Piccardo presided over the function.

Mr. Sukumar, Azheekode of St. Aloysius College, Mangalore inaugurated the Malayalam Association. The Principal was in the chair. The inaugurator spoke on various aspects of Malayalam poetry.

On 8th September '55, there was the combined inauguration of Maths. & Science Association and Hindi Association. Mr. P. S. Nair of Guruvayurappan College presided and Mr. Jacques. Retired Principal of St. Aloysius College, Mangalore and Mr. Anandan Nair "Praveen" inaugurated the above-mentioned Associations.

Meetings: The Independence Day was celebrated under the auspices of the College Union on 15th August '55. Annual Report of the College

for the year 1955 - '56.

(Presented by the Professor-in-Charge)

Mr. President and Gentlemen,

have great pleasure to present to you the Seventh Annual Report of the College and I am very glad to have Sri R. C. Joseph, B. A., Collector of Malabar to preside over the College Day of this year and to give away the prizes.

Staff: At present there are 39 members on the staff of the College, including a part-time Professor in Mercantile Law and a part-time Religious Instructor. There is also a part-time Medical Officer for the College. This year an additional post was created in the Commerce Department with a view to give special coaching to non-I-Com. students of the Junior B. Com class. Mr. M. C. Kunhikrishnan Nambiar, B. Com., who passed out of this college was appointed to the post-

Change of Staff: During the year under report, the following changes have taken place in the staff.

Mr. A. P. Ibrahimkunju, M. A. L.L. B., Lecturer in History was granted study-leave from 13-6-'55 to 31-3-'56 to join the Annamalai University as a research scholar and Mr. K. Mohamedkunju, B.A. (Hons.) was appointed in his place on 21—6—'55. He was selected for an appointment under the Govt. of India and left us on 25—10—'55.

Mr. N. V. Vergese, B. A. (Hons), Lecturer in Mathematics was relieved on 15—6—'55 and Sri R. Sivaramakrishnan, B. Sc. (Hons.) was appointed in his place on 1—7—'55.

Mr. M. Abdu, B. Sc., Demonstrator in Chemistry was relieved on 1—7—'55 to undergo training in the Teachers Training College, at Calicut. Mr. V. M. Mohamed Hussain, B. Sc. was appointed in his place on the same day.

Mr. K. M. Abubacker, M. Sc. was appointed Demonstrator in Chemistry on 18—6—'55 and promoted as additional lecturer on 1—7—'55. He left us on 31—10—'55 to join the Muslim University, Aligarh as a research scholar. Mr. V. M. Mohamed Hussain, B. Sc. was then promoted as additional lecturer in his place and Mr. R. Abdul Rahim, B. Sc. was appointed Demonstrator in Chemistry.

Mr. A. K. Abdul Majeed, B.Sc. additional lecturer in Physics was granted leave from 10-7-55 to go for higher studies in the Muslim

University, Aligarh. Sri D. S. Pai, B. Sc. was promoted additional lecturer in his place and Sri. T. V. Raman Nambissan, B. Sc. was appointed. Demonstrator in Physics on 19—8—'55.

The period for which the services of the Principal Janab Syed Mohideen Shah Sahib, M. A. L. T., were lent to the College by the Government of Madras expired on 15—9—'55 and his services were returned to the Government. In this connection I should like to place on record the great services rendered to the College by Mr. Syed Mohideen Shah, the former Principal.

As a temporary measure, Mr. N. V. Beeran, Professor of Mathematics, was appointed Professor-in-Charge to perform the duties of the Principal and Sri G. Narayanaswami, B. A. (Hons.) was appointed Honorary Professor in the vacancy caused by the relief of Janab Syed Mohideen Shah.

Strength: The strength of the College in the beginning of the year was 657; about 100 students more than in the previous year. There were 264 students in the Junior Intermediate, 182 in the Senior Intermediate; 75 in Junior B. A; 46 in Senior B. A; 54 in Junior B. Com. and 36 in Senior B. Com. The present strength is 650; that is 263 in Junior Inter; 179 in Senior Inter; 74 in Junior B. A; 46 in Senior B. A; 52 in Junior B. Com. and 36 in Senior B. Com.

Results: The results of the University Examination of March—April, 1955 were as follows:—

Intermediate: Full pass 91 out of 194—i. e. 47% with 5 1st classes, 8—2nd classes and 78—3rd classes:

B. A. Degree: Full pass 10 out of 28—i.e. 35%. Mr. P. P. Kunhammed secured the University 1st Rank in Part III and won the Raihan Prize:

B. Com. Degree: Preliminary Examination: 20 out of 30, ie. 66 %. Final: 9 out of 27—ie. 33 % with 2 second classes.

In the B. Com. Degree Examination of March April, 1955, the first two tanks in the University were secured by our students, M/s. M. V. Rajagopalan Nair and M. C. Kunhikrishnan Nambiar, the latter being on our staff at present. Mr. Rajagopalan Nair has won two prizes from the University—The Sir T. Mackenzie Ross Prize and the Principal V. V. Narayanaswamy Naidu Prize.

Hostels: There are three hostels attached to the College. The Main Hostel, the New Hostel and the North-East Hostel M/s. E. Shahul Hameed, B. A. (Hons), N. A. Kareem, B. A., B. T., and N. K. N. Menon, M. A., B. T., are the Deputy Wardens of the Hostels. There is a Hostel Advisory Committee to advise the Principal on matters connected with the Hostels and Lodges and there are sub-committees for auditing the monthly accounts and for suggesting improvements for

each hostel. I am deeply thankful to the Deputy Wardens and the members of the Hostel Advisory Committee and the Sub-committees.

There are 235 students in the three hostels of the college. A large number of students are residing in lodges for want of accommodation in hostels. Students in the lodges are placed under the charge of members of the Staff, who are their 'local guardians.' More hostels are required to accommodate the increasing number of students.

Sports and Games: The College teams participated in the Inter-Collegiate tournaments in Foot-ball, Volley Ball, Basket Ball, Cricket and Hockey.

We also entered Inter-Collegiate Sports. T. Damodaran of Class II came out successful in 1500 metres and 800 metres race. C. P. Mohamed of IV B. A. secured the third place in long jump.

Inter-house tournaments and annual sports also were conducted. Prizes for the winners in the same are to be given away by the President of the Day.

Pavilion: The Government of India have sanctioned a grant of Rs. 9430/- for the construction of a Pavilion for the College. The cost of construction is estimated to be Rs. 13,627/-. The construction has been already taken up.

Gymnasium: The gymnasium built for the College by Sri P. Achuthan Nair, Proprietor, Indian Motor Service, Manjeri will be ready for use shortly.

Play-fields: The 'existing play-fields have yet to be improved and additions to be made.

College Council: The College Council is an Advisory Body consisting of the Professors and other members of the Staff nominated by the Principal. It has functioned successfully this year. I am taking this opportunity to thank the members of the Council for their hearty co-operation and valuable advice on important matters.

Literary Activities: Under the auspices of the College Union and affiliated associations a number of meetings were held. The Secretary of the Union will present the report of the activities of the Union and affiliated associations. Competitions were held in the various items of academic activities and prizes are to be awarded to the winners on this occasion.

Special Prizes: (1) The Kumaraswami Raja Prize to be awarded annually to the student of the College who secures the highest marks in the Intermediate Examination is awarded this year to M. K. Veerankutti. who passed with first class securing 680 marks out of 950 in all the three parts together labout 72%).

(2) The Hajee N. K. Seethi Mohamed Prize annually awarded to the student of this college who passes the B. A. Degree Examination

in Gr. IV (d) (Islamic History and Culture) and secures the highest marks in the subject is won this year by P. P. Kunhahamed who passed the examination of March, 1955. He secured the Ist rank in Part III and won the Raihan Prize from the University of Madras.

- (3) The Ismail Memorial Prize annually awarded to the student of this college who passes the B. A. Degree Examination with highest marks in all the parts taken together goes to Ibrahim, N. V. who passed the examination in March 1955.
- (4) This year the Management of the college has offered two special prizes to be awarded to M/s. M. V. Rajagopalan Nair and M. C. Kunhikrishnan Nambiar who secured the 1st and 11nd University Ranks in the B. Com. Degree Examination, March 1955.

Library: There are 4592 books in the library as against 4132 shown in the annual report of last year: The library is still in great need of many more books. A library committee with Sri V. K. Achyutha Menon, M. A., B. Com., Professor of Commerce as Chairman, and M/s. V. Mohamed, M. A., K. V. Abdulrahiman, M. A., M. Noor Mohamed, B. Sc. and K. R. Achuthan, M. A., B. L., as members was constituted for the purpose of examining the present position of the library and Reading Room and making necessary suggestions for improving the same. The committee has submitted a detailed report in which the need for having at least 10,000 volumes in the Library and better accommodation for the Library and Reading Room have been stressed. I request the Management to help the implementation of these recommendations at least by stages.

Departmental Libraries: Besides the general library there are Departmental libraries maintained by the Nat. Science, Physics and Chemistry Departments. The heads of the concerned departments are in charge of these.

Islamic Seminar: The Islamic Seminar is having a small number of books on Religion, Philosophy, History and Culture and a few periodicals on Islam published in and outside India. We are trying to procure more books and periodicals on different religions. The Library Committee has suggested certain modifications in the case of the Departmental Libraries and improvements in the case of the Seminar. They are being implemented.

The amount of Rs. 1,000/- donated by the P. C. C. Kuttippuram is being used for purchase of books. We have been able to procure some books of outstanding value and general interest. We hope that by the end of this year it will be possible for us to complete the purchase and transfer them to a separate Almirah as agreed to. On behalf of this institution I thank the P. C. C. for the generous donation.

Reading Room: 4 dailies, 24 weeklies, 15 monthlies and 5 quarterlies published in and outside India are being subscribed for the Reading Room and the students are making full use of them.

Social Service League: There is an advisory Council for the Social Service League consisting of 7 members of the staff and 2 students. The enthusiasm of the members of the Council and the League has enabled us to do many useful items of work during the year

The annual camp was conducted at Kongad in Palghat Taluk in the Community Project Area. The camp was financed by the Government of India. About 100 students and 4 members of the Staff took part in the camp. They constructed a new road of 1840 yards. They repaired and made usable a number of tanks and wells in the area which have been lying abandoned for years. They also repaired many by-lanes for the use of the public. The work of the camp was appreciated by the Government and the public. The duration of the camp was one month from 16—4—'55 to 15—5—'55. The next annual camp is proposed to be held at Payyannur in North Malabar.

The Social Service League also rendered another great service by repairing part of the road from Chungam to Ramanatkara included in the Local Development Scheme. The purpose for which this road is repaired is to make it fit for heavy vehicular traffic with the hope of getting service buses diverted along this road. The staff and students have been experiencing great difficulties for want of sufficient buses in the line. We are in correspondence with the authorities on the matter.

Co-operative Store and Canteen: The Co-operative Store and the Canteen continued to work as in the previous years. A new building to house the College Canteen has been proposed. The construction will be taken up in due course.

Attendance: The attendance of the students was generally good. A major section of the students abstained from their classes for 4 days as a protest against the relief of the Principal, Janab Syed Mohideen Shah on the expiry of the term of his service in the college.

Tutorial System: The tutorial system continues to work, with certain modifications in the scheme. Every effort is made to watch closely the progress of the students.

Magazine: The College annual was issued in June 1955 and it contained a number of useful articles from the members of the staff and students. Sri K. R. Achuthan, M. A., B. L., Lecturer in English is the Editor-in-charge of the Magazine.

College Volunteer Corps: There are about 100 members in the Volunteer Corps. They have done commendable work in cooperation with the college Social Service League. Sri M. Padmanabhan Nair, M. A., B. T. is the Commandant of the Corps and M. P. Ismail of IV B. A. the Captain.

Religious Instruction: Religious Instruction is imparted to Muslim students of the College by the Lecturer in Arabic and the Part-time Religious Instructor. Special tests are conducted and prizes awarded to those who have shown high proficiency in Religious

knowledge.

Poor Boys Fund: 45 students are being helped from the Poor Boys Fund of the College in the form of monthly scholarships. An average amount of Rs. 400/- per mensem is required for this purpose. This work is being done with great difficulty. Subscriptions and donations are received from the staff and students of the college as well as from the public. Our thanks are due to all those who have helped us in this matter.

In this connection I announce with pleasure that a hostel will be constructed and made available for use next year for giving free lodging to financially poor students of the college.

Permanent Fund: A permanent endowment for the Poor Boys Fund has been a dire and long-felt need. I have great pleasure to announce here that 16 students of the College have come forward with a request to create a permanent fund for giving financial aid to the financially poor muslim students of the college in future. They have contributed an initial amount of Rs. 1,000/- and forwarded a request to the authorities of the College to build up a sufficiently big fund upon this foundation. The management has offered an equal amount to start with. The amount is to be invested in a profitable concern and its proceeds used for giving scholarships. The students who have voluntered to contribute this amount are M/s.

I take this opportunity to appeal to all to help, us in making this noble venture a success.

Accommodation: Separate rooms have been provided for the staff of different departments rendering the maximum of convenience possible under the present circumstances. We are in need of more class rooms and bigger halls for holding meetings and conducting examinations. The construction of the Natural Science Block has been taken up and that of the Commerce Block is progressing.

Furniture: A number of items of furniture has been added this year, including tables, shelves and chairs for the Departmental rooms. More items of furniture are required for the library, Laboratories and the Staff Room.

Water Supply and Electricity: Arrangements for the supply of water and gas to the laboratories are being made. The work will be complete only when electricity is available. The College and one of the hostels have already been wired, for getting, electric connection. Two more hostels remain to be wired.

Re-Organised Scheme of the University: The re-organised scheme of the University requires the abolition of the present Intermediate Course and the introduction of the Pre-University Course in its place, in the year 1956-57. With the implementation of the new course, additional accommodation for the increased strength applied for has to be provided. The Natural Science and Commerce Blocks will have to be ready for occupation by the beginning of the next academic year. Similarly the Laboratories and Library also require expansion.

Conclusion: This year is a year of many important changes for the college and hence a year of great difficulties for us, requiring much effort and endurance on our part.

I am thankful to the Management for their ready help and guidance and indebted to the staff and students of the college for their whole-hearted co-operation.

I wish and pray to the Almighty that we may be able to overcome successfully all the difficulties in our way and that the College may progress from strength to strength.

College Day

The eighth College Day of Farook College was held in the pandal put up near the college play grounds on 19th February, 1956. Sri R C. Joseph, B. A., Collector of Malabar presided on the occasion. The Professor-in-charge and members of the Managing Committee received the Collector on his arrival and led him to the meeting place. The function began at about 4-30 p. m. with a prayer. Janab M. V. Hydrose Saheb, B. A., B. L., member of the College Managing Committee, welcomed the gathering.

Professor K. A. Jaleel read the names of some distinguished persons who had sent messages wishing the function success. Mr. N. V. Beeran, Professor-in-charge, then read the Annual Report. Dealing with the results of the University examination of March-April 1955, the report said that in the B. Com. Degree Examination the first two ranks were secured by students of this College, to whom the management has awarded two special prizes. Another noteworthy feature was that the Government of India have sanctioned a grant of Rs. 9430/to build a pavilion for the college, the construction of which has been already taken up.

Mr. E. Vasu, Secretary of the College Literary Union, read his report, setting forth the activities of the Union during the year.

The President began his speech by expressing regret in his inability to visit the institution earlier, particularly because it was the first college started in Malabar after Independence. He was glad that he got an opportunity to do so now. Another thing that he stressed was that when compared to city and town colleges the students of this college lacked several amenities, including electric light. He hoped that in the near future these deficiencies would be removed. Regarding the unrest among students, he said that it was mostly due to the difference in outlook of the present and past generations. The previous generation lived under foreign domination whereas the present generation is completely free. He advised the students to exercise sufficient restraint over themselves, to study well and to contribute their mite to build up a bright future for their country. He wished the students success in their endeavours and a bright future for the college. With a vote of thanks proposed by the Professor-in-charge the function came to a close.

Another year has passed by and that completed the 7th year of the life of this hostel. The year has been one of great importance both internally and externally. The inmates evinced great interest in all the activities of the hostel and college.

Elections: The hostel re-opened on 18th June with 50 senior students. The juniors soon rushed in and by the first week of July the hostel was filled to capacity. The elections to the various offices were held early in July and the following persons were elected:

Parliament: The Hostel Union Parliament was inaugurated by Mr. K. Kunhirama Menon, Advocate, Kozhikode on 4th August. Principal Syed Mohideen Shah presided. The student Speaker welcomed the guests and the function ended with the vote of thanks by the Secretary.

Two parliaments were held in the course of the year. Members took active part in them. Several resolutions were passed after heated discusions. The interesting questions by the members and the quick, apt but funny answers by the Ministers were enjoyed by all.

Meetings: Special meetings were held on 15th August, 2nd October, 30th October, 14th November and 26th January to celebrate the Independence Day, Gandhi Jayanthi, Prophet's Day, Nehru Jayanthi and the Republic Day respectively. The Deputy Warden presided and several members spoke on the significance of the respective days.

Magazine: This year, two issues of the Magazine 'Pulari' were published. The first issue was presented to the public by Mr. M. A. Shukkur, M. A., LL. B., in a function arranged for the purpose on the 15th August 1955. The second was presented by the Deputy Warden on 11th Feb. 1956. Both the issues were attractive editions. Thanks are due to the Magazine Committee and the Artist K. P. Balan.

Mess: The Mess is run by the students under the supervision of the Deputy Warden. A mess secretary is elected usually every month to conduct the mess. Thanks to the Secretaries V. Balasubramaniam, K. V. Mohamed kunhi and P. K. Ramachandran, the food supplied is good and the rates moderate. There is also a mess committee to advise the Secretary.

Tournaments: This year the hostel conducted the 5th Inter-Hostel Badminton and the 4th Inter-Hostel Carroms Tournaments. There was a good response from all the three hostels. The prize distribution function was held on 12th Feb. with Mr. N. V. Beeran, B. A. (Hons.) Professor in charge in the chair. Mr. V. K. Achutha Menon, M. A., B. Com., distributed the prizes. There was also a tea party. The Deputy Warden welcomed the guests and the Secretary expressed a vote of thanks. A notable feature of this year was that prizes were allotted to the winners of the losing semi-finals. So far as the hostel is concerned this year is important because we have bagged almost all the prizes with the exception of two or three.

As usual this year also the students took great interest in sports activities. They constructed a Badminton Court on the eastern side of the Hostel. A few of them represented the college in other centres and a good number of them obtained prizes in the college sports.

Year's batch was more enthusiastic than those of the previous years and their presence was to a great extent responsible for the increased activities of the hostel. The senior students are busy with their books but have contributed their reasonable mite for the success of hostel life this year.

Report, 1955 - '56.

Ohe beginning of this academic year witnessed an unprecedented enthusiasm among students and they took active interest in all the activities of the Hostel.

Students are given their rightful share in the administration of the Hostel. There are elected representatives to look after various matters connected with the hostel life. The hostel is more or less a small self-governing community.

Maximum opportunities have been provided for extra-curricular activities. A social service group was organised and this band of enthusiastic students has done good and commendable work during the year. Facilities for the following outdoor and indoor games have been provided in the Hostel-Volley Ball, Badminton, Tennicoit, Carroms and Chess.

After a keen contest Mr. M T. Moidutty was elected as the General Secretary and Mr. Balachandra Panicker as the Speaker of the Hostel Parliament. Elections to various other committees were held simultaneously.

The Hostel Union was inaugurated by Sri P. T. Bhaskara Panicker, President, Malabar District Board on 12th August '55. Principal Syed Mohideen Shah presided over this inaugural function.

The first sitting of the Hostel Parliament was on 19th August '55. After the opening speech of the Deputy Warden there was a lively discussion on the motions moved and the decency, dignity and decorum of the house were maintained throughout by the chair.

A function was got up on 5th November '55 to bid farewell to Mr. K. Mohamedkunju, B. A. (Hons.) who was the deputy warden. Prof. N. V. Beeran, B. A. (Hons.), Warden presided. Several students and Sri N. A. Karim, present Deputy Warden, spoke paying tributes to the work done by Sri Mohamedkunju and wishing him well in his new career.

To celebrate the Prophet's Day a meeting was held on 10-11-55 with the Speaker of the Hostel Parliament in the chair. Janab M. A. Shukkoor, M. A., LL. B. and Sri A. Kunhabdulla, former Sub-Editor of Powrasakthi spoke on the occasion.

Nehru Jayanti was celebrated on 14-11-'55 with Mr. N. A. Karim, Deputy Warden in the chair. Students and the President spoke on the greatness of our Prime Minister and the yeoman services he has rendered to the national movement of this country and the building up of a strong, prosperous and socialistic India.

The Second session of the Hostel Parliament met on 17th Nov. '55. The session was lively throughout. Almost all members participated in the debates and discussions. The session which began at

8-30 p. m. sat very late into the night.

The first issue of the Hostel Manuscript Magazine "Prathibha" was published on 28th Nov. '55. A meeting was held in connection with this in which Sri H. M. A. Shukkoor, M. A, LL. B., presided. Sri

Several Junior and Senior students associated themselves with the fine sentiments expressed by the proposer of the toast and the replier. The Warden and the Deputy Warden also spoke wishing the senior students success in their coming examinations and more signal success in their later life.

Report of Hostel North East, 1955 - 1956.

Chis hostel is situated to the north-east of the college. It provides accommodation for forty students. The mess served here is purely vegetarian. The mess rate is calculated on a basis of dividing the total expenses among the boarders.

Most of the hostel affairs are managed by student representives. They are elected by the members of the hostel. These elected representatives are in charge of Mess, Fine arts, Games and Sanitation. A speaker is also elected from among the students. He presides over the hostel parliament. These elected members together with the Deputy Warden form the hostel cabinet.

The Hostel Union was inaugurated on 14–8–'55 by Sri P. C. Kutti Krishnan, a well known Malayalam short story writer. During the first and second terms the hostel parliament met in session. It was a great success in giving training to the students in parliamentary procedure.

Besides the above activities, the members of the hostel celebrated the Nehru Jayanthi and Tunjan Day. Condolence meetings were also held to pay due respect to the memory of the late Acharya Narendra Dev and Sri Mavlankar. Many students spoke on these occasions.

The annual day of the hostel was celebrated on Monday 20—2—'56. After an enjoyable teaparty the meeting began with Mr. N. V. Peeran, B. A., (Hons), Professor-in-charge in the chair.

The hostel members also published two issues of a manuscript magazine named 'Kaithiri' It gave an opportunity to give expression to the various innate capacities in the students in drawing, painting and literature.

Report of the

College Social Service League, 1955 - '56.

The year under review has been one of steady work by members of the Social Service League. The rush of students in the beginning of the first term to enroll themselves in the League has shattered the record of previous years and it is in short a high watermark in the history of this organisation. The League has now to its

credit the efficient service of as many as 225 members.

On 19—7—'55 the Principal, Sri C. M. Syed Mohideen Shah, M. A., L. T. who is also the President of the League nominated Sri M Padmanabhan Nair, M. A., B. T., Sri M. Gopinath, M. A., Sri V. G. K. Nair, B A. (Hons.) Sri N. A. Karim, B. A. B. T., M. P. Ismail, (iv u. c.) and K. Kammukutty, (iv u. c.) as members of the Advisory Council of the Social Service League. The Council elected Sri M. Padmanabhan Nair as the Vice-President and Sri M. Gopinath, as the Secretary of the League. M P. Ismail and K. Kammukutty were nominated as the Captain and Vice-Captain of the League for the year 1955—'56.

As the council felt that for efficient and smooth working the division of the League into smaller units was necessary, the entire League was divided into 31 squads and the captains of these squads were selected on 23—8—'55.

Though the members of the League were very anxious to engage themselves in useful out-door work the adverse weather conditions always proved to be a stumbling block. In September, however, the League decided to commence its activities by repairing the College Ramanatkara Road with a view to make it a motorable 18" road. At this time the Principal left the college and on 16th Sept. 1955 Sri N. V. Beeran, B. A (Hons.), Professor-in-charge became the President of the League. The new President nominated Sri V. K. Achyutha Menon, M. A., B. Com., Sri K. A. Jaleel, M. A., Sri S. Krishnan, B. Sc. and Sri V. Mohamed Hussain, B. Sc. as additional members of the Advisory Council. As per the directions of the council the work in connection with the College-Ramanatkara Road actually began on 1st November 1955. As many as 200 students turned up for work on the first day. The enthusiasm of members was evidently seen reflected in the quickness with which the country tract attained the look of a useful road For want of implements members had to work in shifts and the work continued for 20 days. The activities of the League had to be suspended then in view of the terminal examinations.

As the project is included in the L.D. Schemes, the Government is meeting half the expenses incurred for the construction of this road. The grant received from the Government along with the funds available with the League is being used for the construction of the culverts and the work of the same is in progress now. Since only half the work of the road has been completed the League will be resuming its activities as early as possible.

The last but not the least important item of our year's programme will be the Social Service Leage Camp which will be conducted during the summer vacation at Payyanur in North Malabar. The members of the Advisory Council as well as the members of the League are all anxiously awaiting this rare opportunity when the services of a hundred enthusiastic and energetic workers of the League will be utilised to change the face of Payyanur.

To all our friends who have worked in the programmes of the year we extend our thanks.

Report on the Sports & Games and related activities of the College during the year 1955 - '56.

During the year we played a good number of matches in Foot Ball, Hockey, Basket Ball and Volley Ball with the Christian College, Kozhikode, Universal Sports Club, Feroke Town Club, the Nanminda High School, the Malappuram Town Club and the Railway Institute, Kozhikode.

In the Inter-Collegiate Volley Ball, Basket Ball, Cricket and Foot Ball Tournaments we lost in the first round itself.

Our College Hockey team came out successful in the matches held at Trichur. Without much opposition our team scored easy victories over. The Sacred Hearts College, Thevara and the Govt. Victoria College, Palghat. In the Semi-finals of the Division our team had to face the Guruvayurappan College at Calicut and they held to a draw on the first day. In the re-play they won the match by a solitary goal. Thus our Hockey team came to the Semi-finals for the first time in the history of the College.

Five competitors took part in the Inter-Collegiate Sports held at Ernakulam this year. T. Damodaran of the II u. c. came out successful with flying colours in 1500 and 800 metres races. C. P. Mohamed of the IV B. A. won the third place in Long Jump also.

For the purpose of conducting the House Tournaments all the students were divided into four houses. Each house was to send a team for each of the games for which provision is made in the College. All the matches this year were keenly contested amidst unparalleled enthusiasm of all the students. The Akbar House captained by Mr. Ismail Ali of IV B. A. won the championship by scoring 19 points.

The annual Athletic meet this year was held on 17th, 18th and 19th Feb. 1956. The College foot-ball ground was lavishly decorated and a pavilion was erected to accomodate the visitors. K. Raghavan Nambiar of the I u. c. won the individual championship while the Tippu House scored the highest number of points. A special feature of this year's meet was that we had a number of interesting items such as Sack-race, Sack fight, Staff's Race, Clerks' Long Jump and Peons' Race along with the major items. Mr. R. C. Joseph, B. A., Collector of Malabar presided and distributed the prizes.

This report will be incomplete without expressing gratitude to the Professor-in-Charge and to the members of the Physical Education Council for all the help and guidance they rendered during the year.

Report on the Summer Youth Camp

and

Labour Service by Students of Farook College.

The campers consisting of 83 students and four lecturers assembled at 7-30 p.m. on 15-4-55 at the K. P. R. P. High School, Kongad under the leadership of Sri M. Padmanabhan Nair, M. A. B. T., Vice-President of the Social Service League and Commandant of the Camp. The activities of the camp began the very next day. Different committees were constituted to enable the campers to learn how group work should be done. The Secretary of the local Project Advisory Committee informed the Commandant that the most useful work that the campers could do was the construction of the Kongad Parli road linking the two places, Kongad and Parli, by a four-mile road. Half a mile of the road had already been completed. The campers therefore took up the construction of the remaining portion. The road was to be constructed along a narrow rugged foot path of hard terrain, descending and ascending, with bushes, thorns and trees on either side. The flow of water had eroded the soil on either side at many places. The conversion of such a foot-path into a road was indeed a task of great difficulty.

The survey work was done on 16—4—'55 and daily routine decided (Appendix A) The construction began unostentatiously and the work progressed as shown in the diary of work (Appendix B). The work was finished in two stages. The first stage was begun from the other side of the stream which flows across the road and which is to be bridged to complete the road. On 30—4—'55 the road up to 'Mucheri Mala' was completed. As the work along the pass in the hill required skilled and hard labour and as the place was two miles away from the camp the limit was set there. The Project Advisory Committee was advised to finish the two-furlong road along the hilly terrain by paid labour and the Commandant of the Parli Camp was approached for commencing work on the other side of the hill. With this liaison established the first stage came to a close.

It was however reported that the Parli campers were prevented from proceeding with the work by the intransigence of the landlord. It is for the Project authorities to settle the land dispute and make the Kongad-Parli road a finished one.

To take up the second stage of the work the Commandant of the camp and the Secretary of the Project Advisory Committee met the persons through whose land the road on this side of the stream was to be constructed. It was agreed that the road could be constructed with minimum loss for all concerned. But when the campers came to the spot next day one of the parties affected, who was absent on the previous day, raised the objection that the proposed lay-out would entail great loss to him and if the lay-out was altered the sacrifice involved would be shared by all. As there was substance in his plea it was agreed to change the lay-out and next day the construction was proceeded with. Thus the second stage was begun on 2—5—'55 and completed on 6—5—'55 and on the whole a road 1840 yards in length was newly created. The same evening the Assistant Project Officer and the Commandant had a ride in the jeep. There was the joy of using the road created and completed just a few hours ago and seeing a wide prospect provided by a road girdling a hill.

The Secretary next suggested the improvement of the useful by-lanes. Several of them were narrow, gorged and dirty. During nights they were dangerous. One after the other the campers took them up and converted eight of them into beautiful, convenient lanes. Some of them were used by labourers who after their day's work found it very difficult to return to their homes. They could use the improved lanes now without fear off all or splash or reptiles.

The wide foot-path branching off from 13/5 mile stone on the main road was taken up for improvement and conversion into a road on 11—5—'55. Half the campers only were used for this work while the rest were improving the bylanes. The foot-path was improved into a road of about a mile in length with partial labour for three days.

The Community Project road near the camp was in a very bad condition. The campers repaired and improved this road.

The wide tank renovated with the help provided by the Project funds was full of the water plant 'Chummi' and was an ugly sight to the tank users. A squad of ten campers cleaned up the whole tank by hard work. At the end the tank looked a tank and the work was very much appreciated by the people

Three wells which belonged to the poor villagers were deepened and when people saw water springing up, tears of gratitude were seen in their eyes. They felt that something they had wished for a very long time, was now available to them. There was great joy both for the campers and the poor people.

Digging of compost pits and demonstrating how waste matter could be converted into useful manure was another item of work. Eight pits were dug in all by small detachments and the idea that such work could very well be taken up by the house-holders was spread.

Social education was also organised on a small scale. It needs mention that when campers do hard physical work, social education which requires concentrated effort cannot be spectacular. However, out of 20 persons enrolled in the beginning six were continuous in attendance and they profited by the evening classes.

Having dealt with the physical work of the campers the general condition of the camp shall be touched upon.

Food: A mess was run by the students themselves with the assistance of a Hostel Clerk and the Deputy Warden of the college New Hostel. Though in the beginning, due to initial difficulties, there was not the expected satisfaction, after gaining experience and as a result of the vigilence of the Commandant, the Deputy Warden and the mess committee, the quality of food improved and there was great satisfaction. Besides getting the food they wanted the campers gained experience about the difficulty of managing affairs for themselves.

Attendance: The Camp began with 83 students and 4 lecturers. 12 more students joined the camp soon after and one other member of the staff also came. Three left in the course of the camp. When the camp broke up on 15—5—'55 there were 92 campers and 5 members of the staff. The Principal visited the Camp thrice on 20—4—'55, 28—4—'55 and 15—5—'55. During the second visit he stayed in the camp for two days along with the students and members of the staff.

Health: The health of the campers was generally good. There were a few weak campers who were affected by cold. Many campers suffered from cuts and bruises due to their inexperience in the use of implements. Treatment was available from the local hospital and the doctor deserves the gratitude of the campers. Considering the hard physical labour involved it may be said that the health of the campers stood in good stead.

Entertainments: For the first twenty days entertainments were organised by the campers and they enjoyed the fun and they retired with a glad heart. Songs and mimicry and folk dance constituted the chief items. These entertainments helped to keep up the good cheer of the campers. In the last ten days the campers were engaged in rehearsals for the drama and variety entertainments to be staged on the valedictory day. On 14—5—'55 the campers had this function. The meeting was presided over by Dr. A. R. Menon, Municipal Chairman, Palghat and the hall was packed to capacity. The drama 'Samagama' a Malayalam fiction was directed by Sri M. Gopinath, the Asst Commandant. The drama and the variety entertainments displayed the high histrionic talents of the campers. There was appreciation that the campers were as good in their talents as they were in road work.

Community living: The great aim of camp life, viz., community living was observed to be defective. There were tendencies to create factions. Bickerings had to be settled by intervention and good counsel. This is mentioned only to show the useful purpose such camps serve to educate the students. Community living has to be fostered even in the earlier stages by camps for school students. This camp, perhaps the only one in the lives of most of the campers, served to round off the angularities of some of them and fostered the spirit of community living.

Contact with villagers: The campers had no need to take special pains for coming into contact with villagers, since the latter appreciated their work and three was good will towards them. The more prominent individuals entertained the campers at tea or dinner and encouraged them. The attitude towards physical labour shown by the campers was calculated to spread the idea of dignity of labour and the villagers could see that there was nothing low about manual

labour.

Morale: Generally the morale of the camp was very high. It was kept up by the daily exhortation before their march to the work spot and cheering words at meal times and other occasions by the Commandant and friendly association by the Lecturers. There were also parades on certain days. In spite of these favourable features there were one or two occasions when morale was undermined by one or two instigators who proved to be bad campers. Disaffection was spread to some extent but the general good sense of the campers was available to the Commandant and critical situations were tided over. The visit by the Principal helped very much to smoothen the situation.

Special occasions: The visit of the Chief Minister, Sri Kamaraj, to the High School was an occasion for the campers to provide a guard of honour and get enlivened. The occasion gave them great joy. In addition to his visit on 15—5—55, the Principal visited the camp twice and spent some time with the campers. The campers were very happy to see him in their midst and know that he appreciated their work very much. The Principal paid visits to the prominent

citizens of the locality.

Usefulness and appreciation: There is no doubt that such camps serve the needs of our country. They help to remove some of the deficiencies of the present educational system and certainly enrich the experience of students. There are two aspects of camp life. One is the spiritual and moral and the other is the actual physical work done. The students themselves have benefited morally. The villagers are also able to realize the moral significance of their life which because of the humdrum nature of their work has tended to dull them. The daily walk of the campers to the work spot and their return march

with merry songs, the public meeting and the entertainment have all demonstrated to the villagers that work and good cheer can go together and that they also can live on a higher plane, provided they

realise the proper spirit of manual work.

Apart from the actual work done the success achieved by the campers in resolving faction and differences to enable them to construct the road when it seemed that differences were insoluble and road work would have to be stopped is of great credit and deserves special mention. The fact that the campers won the appreciation of the people, the local leaders and the Project Officers when there was the prevailing prejudice against the work of college students amply shows that the Farook College Social Service League Camp was run successfully.

Conclusion: The gains, spiritual, moral and physical of having run the camp more than counterbalance the expense incurred and the results achieved should lay at rest the usual criticism against the running of such camps by the Government. This work of the college students was greatly appreciated by the villagers and made all those concerned happy. It set a good example and enriched the life of the campers while contributing to the material and moral progress of

the people.
