Two Sanskrit-Grantha Inscriptions from Palunkil Sivanārāyaņa temple, Killimangalam

Palunkil temple is owned by Killimangalathu Mana. The temple is situated in the Killimangalam village (10.7233° N, 76.3203° E) of Thrissur district. There are three sanctum sanctorums for the temple, two for Lord Siva and one for Vishnu. Two Grantha inscriptions with Kalidina numbers are seen on the side of two namaskara mandapas of the temple. $\dot{srimal} \, kav\bar{a}ta \, s\bar{o}p\bar{a}nam$ and $n\bar{a}r\bar{i} \, hrudisthit\bar{a}yunam$ are two *kali dina* indicators.

The temple is located on the southern bank of river Nila in Thalappalli taluk.
